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1	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Good evening.
2	Welcome to the Calumet Township Board
3	meeting this evening. Can we stand for the
4	pledge of allegiance.
5	(PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.)
6	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Thank you for
7	coming to the meeting this evening.
8	Mr. Piggee, at this time I would like to
9	make a motion that we amend tonight's agenda
10	and take off new business because we don't
11	have any new business tonight, so we need to
12	take it off the agenda. Can I have a
13	second?
14	MR. PIGGEE: I second.
15	MS. HOLMES: It's been seconded. Can we
16	have a roll call, Ms. Bonds?
17	MS. BONDS: Mr. Piggee?
18	MR. PIGGEE: Yes.
19	MS. BONDS: Mr. Washington?
20	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Yes.
21	With two yes, the motion carries.
22	Item No. 2, annual finance report.
23	Mr. Dalton?
24	MR. DALTON: Madam Trustee, would you
25	like me to

TRUSTEE ROBINSON: Yes, please.

MR. DALTON: Mr. Chairman, you had asked that I give a summary of the annual financial report summary of 2018. You'll recall at our previous board meeting in February we acted to adopt and approve the annual report that was submitted by the trustee, which it's required for townships to happen a little earlier than it does for towns and cities and counties. For it to be advertised on time, it has to happen a little earlier in February. So we already took care of that in February.

So what I'm going to do is go through a little bit of a review of the annual report. You have an annual report in your packet. For those of you that are joining us for the first time, this township meeting, I thought it might be more interesting than me just reading a bunch of numbers to give a little bit of background on how the township pays its bills and receives its revenues.

We have five major funds that we receive property tax revenues, three that we consider as civil funds, civil general fund,

civil recreation fund and civil community services fund, and then two township assistance funds.

We are one of the only townships -perhaps the only township -- in the state
that has two township assistance funds at
the demand of special legislation that
required us to split our township assistance
funds a couple years ago into a township
assistance benefits fund and a township
assistance administration fund.

The only effect that did was it took our property tax levy and split it in half. So property taxes flow to the two funds. It did not double it and the associated revenues that go along with property taxes. So similar to a county or a city or a town, we not only receive property taxes from each of those five funds, but we receive the other state distributions. For example, financial institutions tax, commercial vehicle excise tax, taxes that are collected by the state for various fees and services that are distributed to every fund that also receives property taxes most of the time in

a proportion or an allocation similar to the size that the property tax levy.

I think it's important to point out for all of us that are a part of Calumet

Township to know that although the township could levy a substantially higher property tax, the trustee and this board have for the last 5 years chosen voluntarily to reduce the amount of property tax levy that they are asking the property taxpayers to pay below their maximum amount. So most cities and towns and counties and schools levy their max. And that max goes up by 3, 3 and a half, 4 percent per year based on the state-wide growth factor.

And I've worked for many years and worked with about 60 units of government in our firm, and I have not had very many occasions over those years of having a unit not ask for the maximum levy that they're allowed to receive. This township does not and has voluntarily held its property tax request down by more than \$3 million each year for the last 5 years. That's about \$15 million worth of property taxes that

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were not levied on property taxpayers at the request and approval of this township board and this township trustee.

Those property taxes that were levied were levied because there were expenses, and the cash flow projections and budgets that required this township perform its services and duties and those revenues that floated to those five funds, a grand total about \$5.8 million worth of revenues that flowed into the funds. And we spent about \$5 million. We had -- expenditures have continued to decline over the last 5 years as the trustee and the board have worked at creating efficiencies and stayed as small as possible with staff and doing their job which they're legally required to do for many hundreds, if not thousands, of people who are eligible for township assistance.

We can dig into lots of details, and those of you that have spent some time on the Gateway system, which is the state financial system, you'll see on there the annual report for 2018. And that annual report can be downloaded in various formats,

PDF, Excel and lots of details, and you can number-crunch all day, and I will bore you to death if I read you the entire report, but it's worth reading through because it starts out with the fund report which shows you those major funds, the beginning balances, the ending balances, how much was spent, how much was brought in. And then each successive report after that first page shows you the detailed receipts and then the detailed distributions.

And in the case of a township, we're also required to file an extra report that no other body -- no other governmental body is required to file, called a TA-7. And the TA-7 details by count and by dollar how much money has provided -- been provided in township assistance. What we used to call poor relief, now we call township assistance, how much money has been provided in various breakouts to the hundreds, if not thousands, of people who do qualify in Calumet Township.

Mr. Chairman, I can go into elaborate detail, but I already went a little too far,

1 I'm sure, but I'll be happy to field any 2 questions from this board. 3 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Okay. For that, Madam Trustee, do you have any questions or 4 5 comments? 6 TRUSTEE ROBINSON: No. Thank you, 7 Steve. I appreciate that. 8 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Mr. Piggee? 9 MR. PIGGEE: No. 10 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Okay. The next 11 thing I want to say -- first of all, I want to thank Griffith Town Council, first of 12 13 all, to allow us to host our meeting here 14 today. And let me say this, it is long 15 overdue. This is my second term on the board, and we want to make sure that we have 16 17 an opportunity to host meetings from time to 18 time here. One of the things I want to 19 thank the town council president, Rick Ryfa, for extending his arm in having these 20 21 meetings here, and we look forward to coming 22 And I will provide a schedule that we back. passed at the last meeting so all Griffith 23 24 residents will know when those meetings will 25 be here.

1	The next thing regarding the report that
2	Mr. Dalton articulated, I know some of you
3	all have may have went on Gateway. So at
4	this time are there any questions about the
5	annual report that Mr. Dalton may be able to
6	answer from anybody in the audience?
7	Yes, Mr. Ryfa.
8	MR. RYFA: Couple questions.
9	MR. DALTON: Yes, sir.
10	MR. RYFA: You had spoken about the max
11	levy.
12	MR. DALTON: Yeah.
13	MR. RYFA: What is how far under are
14	you? Because we had looked at it. It was
15	considerably more than 3 million, I thought.
16	MR. DALTON: It's about 3 million a year
17	that we've held underneath the voluntary
18	the maximum levy cap.
19	MR. RYFA: Yeah, the numbers we had was
20	higher than that, so they are not taxing us
21	as much as they could.
22	MR. DALTON: Absolutely.
23	MR. RYFA: The bad thing is they could
24	tax us a lot more.
25	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes, they could.

1 MR. RYFA: So my question is: The board 2 did do, you know, a very good job back in 3 2013, 2014, 2015 to reduce the levy and the rates to get under the 12-time specials. 5 believe you're right around \$4 million for б the combined services for township 7 assistance and township administration. 8 So if we go back as close as 2015, we paid around \$1.1 million to the township. 9 And then for 2019 it looks like we're 10 11 projected around 2.3 million. Last year we paid around 2.2 million. Can you explain 12 13 how our levy to Griffith basically doubled 14 over those four years? That's what -- we can't figure that out. 15 MR. DALTON: I will -- I'll do all of us 16 17 a disfavor by trying to go into the weeds on 18 something that's hard to explain in words, 19 but let me try and say, at any point in 20 time that assessed values go down, the 21 counter-balance is that tax rates go up. So there were a couple years in there where 22 23 assessed values for the township declined.

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the exact same amount as it had in the

And so even if the township held its levy at

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previous year, the tax rate would have gone up, and that tax rate then is taxing people even more whose house value didn't go down. Because the overall township did go down, somebody's home that didn't go down would be paying more in that given year. That'd be the easiest summation of how an individual taxpayer or an individual taxing unit might be paying more in even though the levy didn't decrease.

MR. RYFA: Okay. You have to understand from our standpoint, this is like a hundred percent increase. That means your assessed value had to come down like 50 percent in Gary. I know it was going down, but I don't think it went that much, so that is one thing that's really concerning. The trend, it's unsustainable for us.

MR. DALTON: I would like to defer to the trustee on the strategic decision here because obviously when there's a voluntary decision made to hold their levy below their max, there's a whole lot of numbers between zero and max that they can choose, and there were some periods of time there where we

were all very focused on the 12-time multiple. So let me defer to you on the strategy there.

TRUSTEE ROBINSON: I would add to whatever Steve is saying is that we have -- since we came to office, Steve has been our financial adviser, and he has -- he created or helped us create a budget that each year we would do as minimum as we could because we knew the fight, we knew the outlook, the picture of it. So we are at the best place we can be in helping, and you're probably right about Gary and their low assessments. And what can we do about that besides try and stay under and not putting so much of the pressure and the burden on the Town of Griffith?

MR. RYFA: All right. I mean, but that's where we're at right now. You know, our levy's doubled in about four years. The fact that there's a 39 percent property tax collection rate in Gary is basically killing us. We're paying a big disproportionate amount of dollars to the township. I don't know if you've even noticed that yet. We

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were 30, 40 percent of whatever the total property taxes were collected, so it's always about money. You know, you didn't hear much from us in 2014, 2015, 2016 when we were well within the threshold and we saw a significant decrease in our contributions, so now it's doubled, so it's caused some alarm.

MR. DALTON: If I can say this, and I want to be cautious and tactful. During the period of time that the 12-time multiple was calculated in such a way that we had a fighting chance to be within that 12-time multiple, we fought. There was a point in time when the legislature determined or asked the DLGF to change the calculation method and took away our fighting chance.

Now, I think it was at that point in time that we no longer felt like we could cut services. We were below the belt at that point in time, below the quick. I'll use all the cliches. We lost our fighting chance because the calculation method had changed in such a way that it was not possible any longer.

1	MR. RYFA: Okay.
2	MR. DALTON: I hope that was tactful
3	enough.
4	MR. RYFA: Yep. Thank you.
5	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Any more comments?
6	MR. PIGGEE: No, Mr. Chairman.
7	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Council? Anyone?
8	AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'm good. Thank you,
9	Darren.
10	AUDIENCE MEMBER: I just have one quick
11	question.
12	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Go ahead.
13	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Tim Diamond, 406
14	Canterbury Road in Griffith. As all this
15	process was going on, I've been looking for
16	annual reports and obtaining budgets. You
17	have a very nice website, but it just didn't
18	have that type of information on it. So if
19	I go to North Township, they have like the
20	last 3, 4, 5 years of annual budgets and
21	annual reports as opposed to going to the
22	internet and searching, trying to find the
23	Gateway to get all this stuff in there.
24	Is there any access or could there be an
25	access for budgets and annual reports from

1 the website so it's a little bit more 2 transparent. TRUSTEE ROBINSON: The budgets are 3 4 prepared and placed in Gateway. As to 5 that's the only place we are totally 6 authorized to do it. I mean, we could 7 probably put it to our page. That would be a very expensive cost that we try to cut. 8 9 AUDIENCE MEMBER (MR. DIAMOND): It's a 10 minimal cost. 11 TRUSTEE ROBINSON: And if you ask for 12 it, we have forms for your request tonight. If you'd like me to send you every copy, 13 14 sir, I'd be happy to do it. 15 AUDIENCE MEMBER (MR. DIAMOND): Yeah, 16 adding a link to a website is not expensive. 17 It's like five bucks. TRUSTEE ROBINSON: Okay. That's what 18 19 you say. CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: All right. 20 Let me say this, I've had this conversation with 21 Mr. Ryfa, and I've also said this to the 22 23 board. Let me say this, this is not the 24 board. This is Darren Washington as a I've looked at the issues that 25 taxpayer.

we're facing, and Steve and Kim is right.

We have done everything that we can to cut
as much as we can. But I do understand the
problem with what you're paying.

Now, there's a conversation that should be had that -- there are some folks that don't want to have that conversation. Okay. We got to look at why you are paying so much. We got to look at why the assessed value is so low. That has nothing to do with Steve Dalton and Trustee trying to work the budget. It has everything to do, in my opinion, number one, there's a lot of abandoned property in Gary, Indiana --

MR. PIGGEE: A lot.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: -- that needs to be torn down. I've talked to one of our legislators, and this is something that should have been done a long time ago. And Rick, with your convictions on the Republican side, we need to have legislation that will allow vacant homes that are owned by people who have not been living in Gary for years, and that property stays there while they live in California or Dallas.

And if we try to tear it down, then the city gets sued. But that vacant, burnt-down property or whatever, it stays there. That causes us a problem.

No. 2, one issue I have is TIFs, tax increment financing districts. My belief is one of the reason why our assessed value is low is that the City of Gary has between 12 and 14 TIF districts. And if you know about TIFs, you take the money from the property taxes and you invest to make sure that businesses can come. But again, we haven't seen development with those TIFs, and some of those TIFs have been there for a very long time. And so that's something that I believe that the city and the township and all of us can sit down and try to figure out what can be done to get the assessed value higher.

This is the thing, and I know folks may not like it, and I'm going to say it. I don't know if legislation will pass to allow you to go to another township or if it will allow you to stay. My concern right now is that you, as Griffith residents, are members

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and residents of Cal Township. So until
that happens -- and I don't have anything to
do with that -- my goal is to work to find a
solution that everybody can work together
on, that while you are still in this
township, we need to find a way to see how
your payments can be reduced.

And I believe with all of us working together we can talk to our legislators and do something to do that. We can handle this situation. Because until that happens, unfairly, as you stated, the numbers increase. It's not the trustee's fault. It's not Steve Dalton's fault. It's not the board's fault, but I believe there are other independent variables, like the City of Gary, other areas that can be talked about to see how we can increase the assessed value for the City of Gary.

And I'm going to be honest, until some of those things are taken care of -- Trustee has balanced the budget. Steve has done a great job. But those things are beyond our control, but there should be conversations with dealing with that, and we've had those

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conversations Mr. Ryfa on that. And I'm committed as a member of the board to do what I can to try to get that assessed value higher so you can pay something lower, so I'm always willing to sit down and look at what solutions that we can bring to the table so you won't have to pay so much because of the services -- the lack of services that -- or the little services that you say you receive.

So that's basically, again, my opinion. I can't speak for Mr. Piggee or anybody That's my opinion of the research else. that I've done, the conversations that I've had. And when I've talked to certain legislators and I've talked to certain people, everybody is trying to blame somebody else. Everybody is saying it's that problem, it's their problem, but the problem doesn't get fixed. And we talk about transparency. If we're looking at making sure that that value goes up and your bill goes down, there's a lot of different players that can be here, the Mayor of Gary, our county assessor, legislators to look at

legislation that can help that assessed value go up.

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We need to sit down and have that conversation because until then, everybody is looking to help their own cause and to say, hey, it's not me, it's not them, but I believe if we can get everybody to the table and sit down, we can come to a solution.

And also, let me say the Department Local Government Finance, because let's be honest, this is who started it all. I'm just going to be honest with you all. It was one issue. It was one area. Then it was changed. I'm not disagreeing or agreeing that it shouldn't have been changed, but the Department of Local Government and Finance in Indianapolis made the decision to make the decisions that they So we're right now stuck with the decision that they made, but I still believe deep in my heart that all of us can get together to make sure that we can do something to reduce the payments that you have to make while also increasing the assessed value of Gary, Indiana.

Mr. Piggee, do you got any comments?
MR. PIGGEE: Yes, Mr. Chair.

I wanted to come to Griffith tonight because I wanted Griffith to be a part of the Calumet Township, and we want you to speak out. And I so agree with the president and what he just said. I'm really, really trying to get a satellite office for Griffith so you don't have to come to Gary to complain or to do the things that you think the township could do for you.

So I would like to hear some of you, the residents here, about a satellite here in Griffith. If you have any suggestions, we are here to listen to you. Okay. So I would hope that some of you will come to the microphone and help us make this decision about a satellite. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: So at this time if there are no comments regarding the annual report, I want to open it up for public comments from you to come and express your concerns, your solutions of what we can do to try to work together. So if you would

1 like anything to say --2 Yes, ma'am. 3 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Well, I'm not going to go up to that microphone. It's a small room 4 5 here, and my voice is --CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Can you give us 6 7 your name for the record. 8 AUDIENCE MEMBER: My name is Kathy Ruskin, and I'm a resident here in the Town 9 10 of Griffith, and I certainly can feel your 11 frustration and your passion. I have to ask why it took so long. It seems like when the 12 13 ship started to sink, that's when you started taking action. Prior to that, this 14 15 has been going on for 10 years. It's gone through different trustees and nothing. 16 17 so when you talk about reduction, if we were 18 to go into North Township, we're looking at 19 \$500,000 roughly. That's the kind of 20 reduction we taxpayers are looking for, not 21 1.5 million dollars or 1 million dollars. 22 And I don't know what the solution is for --23 it's not Griffith. It's -- we don't know 24 the solution. 25 And that -- and again, Mr. Washington,

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I -- yeah, I think there are a lot of people who would like to see that ship starting to -- or the water starting to raise that ship that is known as Gary. Truly. But that could be decades. It's not going to happen in a year. It's not going to happen in 10 years. So I don't know a solution. These things should have been talked about years ago. So that's one thing I want to comment on. I have something else, but that will be at the end.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Any other comments by the public? And if you have any -- this is the time for public comments because what we'll do is no one will interrupt, and then when the board makes their comments, they'll respond to whatever.

AUDIENCE MEMBER (MS. RUSKIN): Well, this isn't necessarily about our participation in the township, but it does come from a -- as taxpayers in the Town of Griffith, I think the question has to be raised. Currently there's a lawsuit that encompasses the Calumet Township and individually the trustee versus, let's see,

Marsha Moore. And I'd like to know as a taxpayer if my taxpayer money is funding the attorneys that represent the trustee,

Ms. Robinson and the township. I'd like to know who the attorneys are. I'd like to know today what kind of -- my taxpayer money that's being spent on that lawsuit.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Okay. Well, because we don't respond to legal action, she can put that out there, and we can note that on the record. Yeah, because we can't speak on pending legal issues.

Thank you for your comments though.

Any more comments from the public?

Yes, sir. Were you going to say something?

AUDIENCE MEMBER (MR. DIAMOND): Yes.

Tim Diamond again. Just a couple things.

Throughout this process, we've heard over
the last few years about, you know, money
we're putting in and then the little money
that we're getting out. But my question has
been, where do I find the data as far as how
many people ask for the money but then were
denied and what that reason code was.

Because it's not like you're looking on -knocking on doors, saying, hey, do you need
some money kind of thing. People need to
fill out a form and request that.

So that's kind of the data I was looking for. What was the data when we had the flood? What was the data when we had the tornado? How much help was given at those times?

So if you had a satellite office, I'm sure that's easily accommodatible through our Franklin Center. I'm sure there's an office we could set up. I'm sure that's not a big deal. But I guess, I don't want people sitting there twiddling their thumbs either until there's people that come see you. So I would be curious to see where that data was.

So I talked to Frank Mrvan about that.

We had talked about, yeah, that information should be accessible. I'm not sure if in the Gateway system there's a document of some kind, but that would be helpful.

Because it all comes back to the transparency that I mentioned earlier.

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That's why I started looking for the data probably a year ago, as far as, okay, where is the money going? So I'm looking for annual reports. I'm looking for budgets, those kind of things. And it's just, you know, kind of the aggregate comments about, oh, it cost too much money to put that on the website. That's just silly. It's not that big of a deal. So it should be easy for people to find that information and keeping the transparency. Okay. I work in Gary. Okay. I'm the Chief Information Officer at Methodist Hospitals,

so I really have a foot in both camps. Okay. We serve the poor as well.

And when I talked to my case manager, my director of case management, I said, yeah, how much interaction do you have with the township?

She says, well, really, no one. I think there is now because I directed them to make that connection. But prior to that, we had to make a phone call and ask for help for someone who might need funeral services or can't pay for medication or things like

that, things that the townships are supposed to be doing. And usually it's an answer of, well, we don't have any money. So there's never really that connection.

So I asked Frank Mrvan the same question. How do you handle that? North Township has three hospitals in their township, so they kind of have a liaison for all these different areas. So there seems to be a disconnect of two organizations that are really serving the same people and serving the poor.

So for me, as a taxpayer, I'm not worried about the money so much because we're pretty much capped at the one percent. It's how those monies and dollars are being spent is where our frustration came in. And that's how this bill thing came about in the first place is you're following a culture of corruption for the last 50 years. So you get new people in office. So you had a chance. How do you react to that? How do you change that culture of corruption? Because you have that stigma over that, and to change that is a challenge.

1 So all we really wanted to see is that 2 transparency, to make sure that those funds are going to the right people at the right 3 4 time and then make sure that we're not taken 5 advantage of. б So from a taxpayer's standpoint, yes, it 7 sounds like a lot of money we're putting into this, but as a personal taxpayer, we're 8 9 pretty much capped, so there's more money for the town to do more services and things, 10 11 but that's where that frustration lies. 12 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Thank you, sir. 13 Any more comments from the public? 14 Councilman? No? 15 Anybody else, Mr. Ryfa? 16 MR. RYFA: Yep, okay. First of all, I'd 17 like to thank Darren and Mr. Piggee and 18 Trustee for coming here. We have had good 19 communication with everybody. I haven't met 20 Mr. Piggee yet, but we've had some good 21 dialogue over the years. It's certainly nothing that's ever been a personal issue. 22 23 It's just dollars and cents. 24 I hope you truly understand that at 25 least the town -- a lot of people in

1 Griffith, I know the town council, is very 2 committed that a better Gary is going to be a better Griffith. A better Gary is going 3 4 to be a better Lake County. 5 So we would -- I said before, we'd 6 rather just stand on the street corner 7 giving out hundred-dollar bills to somebody 8 who needs it to make a bigger impact in their life than just we get the money and we 9 10 never -- we don't know if anything good 11 comes with it. We'd love to work with you 12 as far as trying to either get legislation 13 or help promote some type of cause to help 14 Gary in certain areas. If there's anything 1.5 we can do as a town, we'd love to partner 16 with you. I would say this from the bottom 17 of my heart, we want to see Gary move 18 forward and get up. So if there's anything 19 that we can do, please let us know. 20 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Thank you. MR. PIGGEE: Thank you. 21 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Any more comments 22 from the public? 23

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TRUSTEE ROBINSON: I would like to say

Madam Trustee?

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thank you, Councilperson Ryfa and all the residents, all the employees that came out today, but comments are duly noted. There are things that we still have to work on, and we can work and we will work towards in any way possible, either getting a better connection if we're able to get an office, if we're able to download everything you're looking for.

Frank Mrvan happens to be a mentor of So I understand your conversations with Mr. Mrvan. I have the same ones daily. I try to keep up with him very -- as quickly and much as I can because he's doing a lot of great things for North Township, and I would like to do the same things. But what I cannot compete with is what happened before I got here in '15. We can't keep holding onto your 10 years and 10 more years. I'm trying my hardest. That's why I took the job. I said that at the beginning, I'm going to do better and not until it's my best, and I'm not at my best yet. I'm still doing better every day in this position. And so it'd be great if we worked together,

1 get it all worked out. I'm all for that. 2 Thank you. CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Board comments? 3 4 Mr. Piggee? MR. PIGGEE: Yes. I want to elaborate 5 on two things that were said. б 7 Ms. Robinson, I like what you just had 8 to say because you can't keep holding onto 9 things that have passed and passed and passed. We got to look to the future. We 10 11 have to look to the future. Mr. Washington, you made a good comment 12 on your evaluation. If we can come together 13 with those legislators and the officials 14 here in Griffith and officials in Gary, 15 16 maybe we can solve some of this money 17 problem because everybody is having these 18 money problems because of the taxes and these types of things. 19 20 So I really wish you would think about 21 it, and our next meeting we come together we 22 can talk about it, but we have to get these 23 legislators on top. We got to get these 24 legislators to understand where the 25 residents are coming from. The residents of

Gary and the residents of Griffith, we need to know where they are coming. Okay.

And the other thing, about this satellite office, it bothers me that Griffith does not have anybody out here servicing them here in their city and they got to come all the way to Gary to apply for this and apply for that. That person doesn't have to be here every day. They can be here half a day three times a week or two times a week. So we need to work on that. You need a satellite office here in Griffith.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Thank you, Mr. Piggee.

My comments, first thing, to this nice
young lady, I heard your comments, and I
want to respond to something that you said
that was so true. You made the comment
about this has been going on for a long time
and why now. As Mr. Ryfa articulated, at a
particular year, there was about a million
coming out, and eventually it began to rise.
So up until that time came, I would assume

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that nobody really looked at the issue because you wasn't paying as much. But now that it has become an issue, let me say this first. There is no excuse why we should have never had meetings in Griffith since I've been on the board. This is my second term. And I take full responsibility for that. Okay. And it's better late than never, in my opinion. And we want to do better by having meetings here.

The next thing, transparency. Sir, you are correct. We're trying to do better as Miss -- our trustee said. Frank Mrvan is the standard. He's an excellent trustee, and we're moving towards that. What I will tell you what I've done, as far as transparency as a board member, one thing that we've done is we make sure that Boss Reporters, this nice young lady that is here taking these transcriptions, we make sure we have court-reported minutes of our meetings. And you can go to my website, which is DW4, the number 4, DW4townshipboard.com. And at the very least, when we approve our meeting minutes, I place them on my website. Okay.

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So you can pull down those minutes of the meetings.

Now, I'm not going to get involved in budgets and all that other kind of stuff because I jut got a little simple website.

Okay. But when it comes to the minutes of the meetings that the board is responsible for, I want to make sure that the board can be transparent to a certain extent. And I make sure that we can have those minutes and you can pull those down if you got the ink to print those. Okay.

The next thing, I appreciate what you said about Gary, Rick. You're absolutely right. But again, as you said, how long is it going to take? I personally believe that it doesn't take 10 years or 5 years. I personally believe that the right people at the table, we can take care of some things as soon as possible.

MR. PIGGEE: That's right.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: And unfortunately, sometimes you have to say things, you have to call things out, you have to be transparent. You say things. And when you

say certain things and when you call certain 1 2 things out, you become not liked. become a person that's -- oh, he's 3 4 grandstanding. No. I know that Griffith pays a lot into Cal Township. But I do know 5 б that the trustee and this board and 7 especially -- I can't give the board the 8 credit. The trustee has done everything she 9 can by cutting hours. She's done everything 10 that she can as far as making sure that the budget is intact. Unfortunately, due to 11 circumstances that we have no control over, 12 13 that assessed value is extremely low. 14 Folks are going to be mad at me, but I 15 don't care. There is some people that can 16 help that assessed value go higher? 17 AUDIENCE MEMBER (MS. RUSKIN): And who 18 are they? 19 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: And they need to be accountable to help that go higher. 20 21 opinion, the redevelopment commission in 22 Gary needs to review the TIFs. And the TIFs 23 that's not working, they need to cut those 24 TIFs down. We need to work with our city

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council and our legislators to create

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legislation to quit allowing people all over the country who haven't been in Gary for 20 years to own property in that city while they don't do any type of maintenance. I know when you go to East Chicago, you go to Hammond, you're not going to -- and I'm pretty sure in Griffith, you're not going to see a burnt-down house on the corner for so long without there being some fines or somebody being held accountable for that, but that has happened in Gary for far too long, and yes, that is on the administration, and we need to have those conversations because what happens in Gary affects Cal Township. You may not like what I have to say, but at the end of the day I got elected by the people to be for the residents, not only for Cal Township. That includes Gary but also Griffith. We're asking -- humbly asking, let's work together. We know a solution won't be made overnight, but I know I and others here are willing to do what we can within our power to try to remedy this situation or

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either lessen the amount that you have to

1 pay every year. And I just think with the 2 people sitting down and shooting different 3 ideas with the Department of Local Government and Finance, we can get it done. 4 5 And again, I'm just a little old board б member that's the board president, and I 7 don't want to step outside the responsibilities of my position as a policy 8 9 person. But we need people that are at the 10 table that have a responsibility, that have 11 executive responsibilities, legislative responsibilities, that can do things to get 12 13 that assessed value up, to do things. 14 Because, again, yes, if you go to North 15 Township, that's what you're going to pay. 16 But there's a strong possibility that you 17 won't be there for a while or you may not 18 even get there. So what I want to see 19 happen, if that doesn't happen, we need to 20 do what we can to lessen this pain that 21 you're feeling right now in case that doesn't happen. 22 23 AUDIENCE MEMBER (MS. RUSKIN): Yeah, but 24 can -- do you see our predicament? 25 CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: I see your

1	predicament.
2	AUDIENCE MEMBER (MS. RUSKIN): Do you
3	see that
4	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Wait a minute,
5	wait a minute, wait, wait. I let you say
6	what you needed to say.
7	AUDIENCE MEMBER (MS. RUSKIN): Okay.
8	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: And we can talk
9	after. And I understand. And if we didn't
10	understand, we wouldn't be here now. We
11	would just say, hey, they're on their own,
12	but I'm here so you can beat me up, and I
13	don't have a problem with that.
14	AUDIENCE MEMBER (MS. RUSKIN): I don't
15	want to do that.
16	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Well, I know. Not
17	beat me up, but hear what you have to say
18	because this board since I've been on
19	here and I can't talk about past
20	boards we haven't had meetings here. As
21	a matter of fact, people get on us because
22	we don't have enough meetings.
23	MR. PIGGEE: Right.
24	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Just to let you
25	know, for the audience, by state law, we are
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mandated to only have at least four meetings per year. And that is to balance the budget, get the annual report and other things. And you know, a lot of times there is no need to have meetings if there's nothing to talk about. And so people criticize, saying, you don't guys don't meet enough.

Well, today I'm going to provide this information, and we have a set schedule now. The next meeting here in Griffith will be July 1st, Monday, July 1st. Also, we have a meeting Monday, May 20th, in Gary.

What I also ask Griffith residents who can make that trek, we'd love to see you in Gary, at township, at some of our meetings too. You can let your voices be heard in Gary also. Remember, if Gary goes, the whole region goes. So there's no problem in coming to Gary and letting your voices be heard, but I also believe you don't need to also have to go to Gary all the time. There should also be opportunities for us to come to Griffith to do that.

MR. PIGGEE: Right.

1	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: So with that being
2	said, the Chair would like to entertain a
3	motion for adjournment.
4	MR. LAY: Mr. Chair?
- 5	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Yes.
6	
7	MR. LAY: Thank you.
	My name is Clorius Lay. I'm an
8	attorney. There's an elephant in the room
9	no one is mentioning, and that is Bill 1177
10	is still operational. So I don't disagree
11	with any idea that has been expressed here
12	today, but until that issue is settled,
13	comes to an end, I'm not sure that many of
14	the things that have been discussed I
15	don't think the state legislature is going
16	to be able to do anything before the year on
17	1177, whether you're going into St. John or
18	North Township. So everything that has been
19	suggested, I agree with, but no one has
20	mentioned 1177. I know Mr. Ryfa
21	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: And Attorney Lay,
22	I don't want to just leave them out there
23	with 1177, so would you or Madam Trustee
24	give a brief synopsis of what 1177 includes.
25	MR. LAY: Okay. There were two bills.

The initial bill after there was a failure -- I'm not going to argue who was right or wrong between St. John and North Township or they did it officially or not. It was found by, I think, Mr. Young (phonetic). I think that's how you pronounce his name.

TRUSTEE ROBINSON: Chyung.

MR. LAY: Chyung. I'm sorry. And that bill is now dead and only received first reading so it -- where you were going to set up your independent township. They then extended you for an additional year to go back to North Township and to St. John Township, which I'm sure Mr. Ryfa and I'm sure other people in the room are aware.

Until that is settled, I think it would be somewhat irresponsible for certain things that have been discussed, which I think they're all great ideas to be done. That has to be settled. Are you in this township or not? And I don't believe the state legislature is going to propose anything unless they kill off 1177 and say -- because they initially said you couldn't do anything

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before July 1. Now -- you know, I assume you've started before now to go back to St. John and North Township.

So until that is done, I don't see how anyone can have satellite and things of that nature. Because if you're gone, meaning you're in a different township, then there would be no need for that to exist. And you have a relatively short time period. can -- the state legislature is going to probably come out, I would assume, in April. I'm not sure what day in April it's going to come out. So I think this is their longest session, but it's going to end, I'm sure, before election of May 7th. So until that is settled, I don't see how anything can be done that would be realistic to do because you don't know if you're going to be here.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: You know, let me say this before you make a comment to that. And I understand what Attorney Lay is saying, but I do know if that opportunity does happen where you are extended more time, you still have to get those two potential townships to accept you. Even if

that happens, there's still going to be a period of time before you can actually move over. Okay. And there's a possibility that you won't.

In my opinion, I don't believe waiting on legislation to pass or not pass because there are residents in Griffith that can use services. And if there's a possibility that there could be a person from Cal Township that come here maybe once or twice a week and provide some help to make it easier for a person to get those benefits, I would love to see that happen.

Again, that's something that the trustee can work on because that's her purview, but again, Mr. Lay is right. But on the other onset, if everything is approved, it's going to take time. So until that time, you're not automatically going to just get those services. You're still part of Cal Township. So in my opinion, until you're actually no longer a part of Cal Township, you're still a part of Cal Township.

Madam Trustee.

TRUSTEE ROBINSON: I would like to also

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just add to that, because there's so much conversation in the difference in coming here, coming to Gary, that we also have an office in the Calumet Township area at 1900 West 41st Avenue. It's our multi-purpose center. It's our shelter, and we have case managers on staff that can see anyone from Gary, Griffith, Cal Township and everything. And I don't know. I'm going to err on the side of caution, too, about this whole big thing of coming to Gary, but it's sort of in between. So maybe if we even had meetings there, that place is set up as well as a meeting place. I know they have done that in the past. When I was on the township board, we had meetings out there, so it's kind of a conduit to both. So that's always open, so I just wanted to add that to everything else.

CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Thank you.

MR. RYFA: Just a couple things just to address the 1177 bill. So essentially, that was another township bill altogether. was an amendment put on there that would allow us to get to November of 2020,

basically. So realistically, unless something happens this year, we're going to be here for a year. I think we should make the best of it. I'd like to sit down with you guys. I think the council would, too, about -- maybe discuss -- I don't know what kind of office space, but let's see if we can do one day a week.

Part of our issue is we don't know what our residents' needs are. We simply don't. And until that is decided, you know, it makes it difficult for an accepting township to say, well, we want them or we don't want them. So that's one end of it.

But I would suggest, though, if we were to get out of the township in two weeks, I would still like to sit down with you guys and girls on a regular basis, if needed to, to see what we can do to help legislatively down state to help anything that -- we're on board. We want to meet with you guys.

And Darren is exactly right that a lot of people don't understand the TIFs and how they work. So when there's a TIF area declared, all that money stays in the

economic development area, the allocation area. So none of that flows to the township or to the city or to the schools. Any new development in Gary is going to be TIF'ed. So that's why we're stuck with that as well. And you know, Griffith would do the same thing.

But our biggest concern, like I said, is these increasing -- exponentially increasing levies that we're paying every year. And when we hit 2020 with the tax caps, we've done our job as a town.

tax -- corporate tax rate every single year.

Our general fund has gone down, the tax rate, every single year by about 30 percent last year. So we're in pretty good shape as a town as it comes to the tax caps, but what the township is going to do to us is -- it's going to hurt. It's going to -- I mean, it's going to affect Griffith's town operations. It's going to affect our departments, the money that we have available.

So that's -- like I said, it's nothing personal. It's just dollars and cents. And

1	now we need to protect the dollars of our
2	citizens, so thanks.
3	MR. PIGGEE: Mr. Chair.
4	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Yes, Mr. Piggee.
5	MR. PIGGEE: First of all, this is my
6	first year on this board, and it's a very
7	interesting board because I've been in this
8	area just about all my life, and I was
9	wondering and I'm wondering now for the
10	persons that need help from Griffith, where
11	do they go? I mean, is there a place? You
12	have the Mansards, and I'm sure there's
13	people over there that need some assistance,
14	these types of things. And I'm very
15	concerned because I want to be there for
16	those people who need that help.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINSON: They come to the
18	township?
19	MR. PIGGEE: They do come to the
20	township.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINSON: Uh-huh.
22	MR. PIGGEE: But they come all the way
23	to Gary; right?
24	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Or they can as
25	Ms. Robinson said, they could go to the Cal

1	Township, or we are going to work on getting
2	a person at least once a week to come to the
3	area.
4	MR. PIGGEE: Okay. All right. You've
5	answered my question.
6	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Attorney Monroe,
7	do you have anything?
8	MS. MONROE: No.
9	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Madam Trustee,
10	anything else?
11	TRUSTEE ROBINSON: No.
12	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Attorney Lay?
13	MR. LAY: No.
14	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: Mr. Dalton?
15	MR. DALTON: No.
16	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: The Chair would
17	like to entertain a motion for adjournment,
18	Mr. Piggee.
19	MR. PIGGEE: So moved.
20	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: All in favor
21	signify by saying, "Aye."
22	MR. PIGGEE: Aye.
23	CHAIRMAN WASHINGTON: No opposed. The
24	ayes have it. Motion is adjourned. Thank you.
